

## **BIOGRAPHIES**



### Jonathan Dawe composer

The highly innovative world of composer Jonathan Dawe joins Baroque imagery with a modernist mix, cast with dynamic dramatic flair. Recent commissions include operas in Montreal and orchestral works with the Boston Symphony Orchestra and American Composers Orchestra, The Wharton Center for Performing Arts, Da

Capo Chamber Players, Load Bang, The Miro Quartet, The Brentano String Quartet, and the Cygnus Ensemble, Awards he has received include recording grants from The Copland Fund for New Music, a Koussevitzky Music Foundation Commission (Library of Congress) and a Fromm Foundation Grant (Harvard University). Jon lives in New York, where is on the faculty of The Juilliard School.



### Jane O'Leary composer

Jane has been active as a composer, performer, teacher, mentor and concert promoter since arriving in Galway, Ireland in 1972 from the USA. Having studied music at Vassar College and Princeton University, she created Ireland's first contemporary music ensemble, Concorde. Recent performances include a portrait concert

in New York City, festivals in Italy and Brazil, with PluralEnsemble in Madrid, as featured composer with Hard Rain Ensemble in Belfast. Triptych, for string quartet and orchestra, was premiered last month in Dublin by the National Symphony Orchestra and Ligeti Quartet. One of Jane's ancestors (twelve generations back) is Richard Warren, a leader onboard the Mayflower.



### Erika Baikoff soprano

Erika comes to us from New York, where she is a current member of the Metropolitan Opera Lindemann Young Artist Development Program. She has performed major operatic roles with Lyon National Opera and was featured as soloist in Mahler's 4th Symphony with the Lyon National Opera Orchestra, directed by Maestro

Daniele Rustioni. Additional recent appearances include performances at Deutsche Oper Berlin, Chautauqua Voice Institute, Songfest, and Internationale Meistersinger Akademie. Erika is the winner of several prestigious international competitions and career grants. A graduate of Princeton University, she also holds a Masters Degree from The Guildhall School of Music in London. Erika appears by kind permission of the Metropolitan Opera Lindemann Young Artist Development Program.



### Timothy Nelson baritone

Timothy gained a degree in Physiology from Cardiff University before studying at the Royal College of Music International Opera School, where he was awarded the McCulloch Prize for Opera. He was a Jerwood Young Artist at the Glyndebourne Festival, winner of the RCM Joan Chissell Schumann Competition and the Gerald

Moore Award Singers Prize, and a recipient of an Independent Opera at Sadler's Wells Postgraduate Voice Fellowship. Timothy has been featured in major roles with Opera North, Glyndebourne, and Welsh National Opera. Additional recent appearances include performances at BBC Proms, Royal Albert Hall, and Royal Festival Hall.

### Mark Forkgen conductor

Mark is Principal Conductor and Artistic Advisor of Kokoro, the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra's contemporary music ensemble, and Director of the London Concert Choir. He has also been guest conductor of a number of leading British orchestras, including the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Orchestra of the Age of

Enlightenment, Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, City of London Sinfonia, and others, and has conducted major orchestras throughout Europe. Mark has premiered more than a hundred works, including theatre works and contemporary operas.

#### **Robert Taub**

Robert was inspired to create Some Call It Home by the desire to explore what we can learn today from events of 1620. As a concert pianist, he has performed as guest soloist with major orchestras worldwide with a repertoire ranging from Bach to music of our time. He has recorded the complete Beethoven Piano

Sonatas, Scriabin Piano Sonatas, and works of Milton Babbitt. He has also built and led several concert series and festivals, including a highly touted series at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, where is only predecessor as Artist-in-Residence was TS Eliot. He is currently Music Director of The Arts Institute, University of Plymouth.
