During the story, we meet a variety of characters from across the school as they find their way through adolescence – experiencing sex, alcohol, smoking, crushes, embarrassment, and pregnancy scares.

The soundtrack is inspired by 50s hits from the rock 'n' roll era, which brings upbeat and catchy songs to compliment the excitement of a teenagers life perfectly.

You will recognise hits including *Summer Nights, Greased Lightnin', Hopelessly Devoted to You* and *You're the One That I Want*. They are ultimate classic musical songs, with an incredible cast to compliment them.





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Foster has a clear desire to put the grit back into the musical, rather than focusing more on

Sandy's vulnerable innocence. He zooms in on the other characters more,

which brings a more wholesome and ensemble story together.

The musical may be set in the 1950s, but the style, fun, music and easy-going story line is just as relatable now as ever. The costumes have a clear 50s feel and the cool hairstyles are enough to carry the show on their own.

With commitment from the cast and creatives, this show is clearly for musical lovers, but is also perfect for those not so familiar with musicals and is a perfect musical to start your love of theatre with.
